
#### China export rebound fuelled by EV sales and trade with Russia





## Pentagon leak fallout will be felt far beyond the battlefield

t's really bad. So bad the Pentagon is not only conducting its own investigation, it also immediately called in the Justice Department to investigate. Over 100 pages of highly classified CIA Operations Center and joint Chiefs of Staff assessments – some intended only for the five eyes intelligence partners, others not releas-able to allies at all – have been exposed. Some are derived from human intelli-gence, so could put assets at risk; many uffereed to US intelligence targets that their communications are compro-mised.
